# PRÉSENTATION SYNTHÉTIQUE

La Journée d'études « Violences de genre en ligne : comprendre, mesurer, agir » s'inscrit dans un contexte où une femme européenne sur trois a subi des violences physiques ou sexuelles, tandis que les outils numériques amplifient la portée des agressions.

Cyberharcèlement et cyberstalking exploitent anonymat et viralité pour causer des atteintes psychologiques, sociales ou économiques avec un effort minimal. Les enquêtes Eurobaromètre, FRA et EIGE révèlent un phénomène encore sous-déclaré : 74 % des adolescent·es estiment que les adultes ignorent les victimes.

Fondée sur la Convention d'Istanbul (2023) et la Directive (UE) 2024/1385, la JE adopte une approche intersectionnelle pour examiner l'impact différencié des cyberviolences sur les femmes, les personnes LGBTIQ+ et les mineur·es. Trois axes guideront les débats :

- Théoriser le continuum des violences sexistes numériques ;
- Affiner la mesure via la combinaison des données administratives et des enquêtes de victimation ;
- Concevoir des réponses multiscalaires liant politiques publiques, design éthique des plateformes, éducation et soutien psychosocial.

En rassemblant chercheurs et chercheuses internationaux, l'événement réfléchira à des recommandations concrètes pour construire un espace numérique sûr, inclusif et respectueux des droits fondamentaux.

# ABOUT THE STUDY DAY

The study day “Gender-Based Cyberviolence: Understand, Evaluate, and Act” takes place against the backdrop of alarming statistics: one in three European women report having experienced physical or sexual violence, while digital tools increasingly magnify the reach of abuse.

Cyber-harassment and cyberstalking exploit anonymity and virality to inflict psychological, social, and economic harm with minimal effort. Yet, surveys from Eurobarometer, FRA, and EIGE indicate that the scale of cyberviolence remains largely under-reported. For instance, 74% of teenagers believe adults do not take victims seriously.

Building on the Istanbul Convention (2023) and Directive (EU) 2024/1385, the event adopts an intersectional approach to examine the differentiated impact of cyberviolence on women, LGBTIQ+ individuals, and minors. The discussion will be structured around three key strands:

- Theorising the continuum of gender-based online violence;
- Refining measurement by combining administrative data with victimisation surveys;
- Designing multi-level responses that connect public policy, ethical platform design, and psychosocial support.

Bringing together researchers and practitioners, this study day aims to reflect on actionable recommendations for a safer, more inclusive digital environment that upholds fundamental rights.
